University of Canada (FNUUniv). While a student, Mr. Delorme served in several capacities within the student association, including vice-president and president, and also served as a student ambassador.

In 2012, he was awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal for his student leadership and the hospitality he showed to Prince Charles and his wife Camilla, Duchess of Cornwall, when they visited FNUUniv in 2012. Mr. Delorme has also been named one of CBC Saskatchewan's Future 40, which celebrates the province's new generation of leaders, builders and change-makers under the age of 40.

Chief Delorme worked as the Student Recruitment Officer for the First Nations University of Canada from 2013 to 2016 when he was elected as Chief. # CEO REPORT

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The COVID-19 pandemic brought challenges, heartache and opportunities to the entire global community. Individuals, communities and organizations in Saskatchewan felt the impact of the pandemic in ways we had never felt before. Eden Care Communities was no different.

We started the year with two cases of COVID-19. We were one of the first organizations in this province to have an outbreak. It was very challenging because the things we knew about COVID-19 were nothing like what we know today. It seemed that every couple of hours, there was new information about COVID-19. Care Partners, Elders and their families responded with tremendous patience and understanding.

Right from the beginning, we responded to this invisible beast that was wreaking havoc. The commitment to protect Elders, Residents and Saplings was extraordinary. Care Partners adapted to the changes in personal protective equipment requirements. They screened in and out of work. They monitored their health and temperature twice a day at home. Through it all, they supported Elders and Residents when families and friends could no longer visit.

Our organization adapted to the new realities brought by the pandemic. Combatting loneliness, helplessness and boredom was a challenge with the restrictions placed on visiting. We adapted and found new ways to help Elders and Residents stay engaged and connected. Nearly 6,000 video chats, patio visits and other social connections took place.

COVID-19 did not create the problems we heard about in long-term care. It put the spotlight on gaps that already existed. Elders, their families and our care team were significantly impacted. It was incredibly hard for everyone.

With the support of the Board of Directors, our organization invested significant amounts of money to keep everyone safe and connected. Most of that money will not be reimbursed by the government. It was the right thing to do. The additional financial investments enabled us to maintain full staffing throughout the pandemic. In some cases, we increased staffing to keep care and support a top priority. We never compromised our values.



# CEO REPORT

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Our organization kept moving forward despite the intense focus on COVID-19. We expanded our supportive housing program to Moose Jaw. In partnership with the Moose Jaw Housing Authority, we were able to help people facing big obstacles maintain their housing.

We opened a new home in Saskatoon for individuals living with diversabilities. Real Roommates showed that with innovative solutions, it was possible to create a unique home situation that was different from group homes. It became a shining example of supporting individuals with what they need and respecting individual choice.

We hosted EngAGE 21, a virtual conference dedicated to transformational aging. Global insights on the topics of aging, empathy, resiliency and technology were shared by speakers from Denmark, the United States and Canada. It was an amazing conference and underscored our role as a thought leader.

Throughout this annual report, you will see statistics, words of support and photos that tell the story of this past year. It was a story that demonstrated we were all in the same storm, just different boats.

I was inspired by the courage, compassion and kindness shown by Care Partners. Their dedication to supporting Elders, Residents, Saplings and families was exceptional.

As we close the chapter on this year, I am looking forward to a new chapter. It will be a chapter that sees us coming around the final corner and crossing the finish line of this pandemic. Together, we will transition to new opportunities.

# SAFETY

Protecting Care Partners, Elders, Residents and Saplings was the top priority during the pandemic. COVID-19 was a dragon that tried at every opportunity to enter our homes. We exerted tremendous effort and commitment to keep the dragon at bay.

We built an Iron Ring of safety around the homes.

The restrictions put in place by the government and safety precautions were designed to keep everyone safe. At no time did we let our guard down.

This Iron Ring required Care Partners do many things. They took their temperature at home twice a day. They screened in and out of work. They wore masks and face shields. They changed their clothes when they arrived at work and when they left. They sanitized their hands, tables, chairs, counters and anything that could be touched.

Throughout the year, we had Screeners at entrances to ensure everyone stayed safe. 97,240 screening questionnaires were completed and we used more than 110,00 face masks. A special thank you to the Saskatchewan Legion for their donation of masks for veterans and spouses of veterans.





# CONNECTION

The restrictions on visiting were a major challenge for families, loved ones and our entire organization. We had to seek out innovative and meaningful ways to keep families and loved ones connected.

With the generosity of donors and funders, we were able to keep people connected. When indoor visiting was restricted, we used technology to keep families and loved ones connected. When outdoor visiting was allowed, we set up a giant tent at RLH and an outdoor patio at Memory Lane and the Suites. In Saskatoon and Moose Jaw backyard patios were used for visiting.

# WE KEPT MOVING



Eden Care Communities is one of Saskatchewan's largest charities. More than 400 employees provide care and support to more than 1,200 people in Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Regina. With that much happening, the year was not just about the pandemic. We kept moving.

In partnership with the Saskatchewan Health Authority, work began on replacing two boilers at the RLH Campus. These new boilers will improve the energy efficiency of the campus.

Based on the success of our supportive housing model at Milton Heights, we expanded that program in Regina and Moose Jaw. In Regina, we partnered with the Kodiak Group of Companies, a Métis recognized company. In partnership, we supported 48 individuals who were at risk of losing their housing.

We also partnered with the Moose Jaw Housing Authority to support 10 individuals at risk of losing their housing.

# WE KEPT MOVING



In Saskatoon, we opened Real Roommates, a group living home for eight individuals living with diversabilities. Real Roommates is the first group living home in our province that families and individuals choose who they want to live with and who the organization is that will support them. In this case, the individuals and families chose Eden Care Communities. It is an innovative solution to a housing and support challenge that lives the Eden Alternative Philosophy of care; placing individuals at the centre of all decision making.

Also in Saskatoon, Prairie Springs Personal Care home was consolidated from two locations into one. Prairie Springs provides care and support to 15 Elders in a beautiful residential home.
